North Island Diving Championships

Between the 1st & 3rd of March, 2019, the North Island Diving Championships were held at the Wellington Regional Aquatic Centre (Kilbirnie pool). Luna Lopez (Room 5) and Francesca Savage (Room 1) took part in the event.

They both competed on the 1, 3, and 5 metre boards. Luna and Francesca are part of the Wellington Diving Club (WDC), where they train hard and learn new dives twice a week. There were about 100 divers from different teams from Auckland, Hamilton, Waikato, and Dunedin. There was a huge crowd, lots of cheering, and splashes. There are different levels in the competition. The higher your level is, the harder your dives will are. There were 5 different judges watching the dives in each event. Luna and Francesca both received a medal and a certificate with the exact amount of points that they got during the competition. The more advanced divers competed on every board, including the platforms (5, 7.5, and 10 metres). These divers actually competed for gold, silver, and bronze medals, like the Olympic divers. Luna said that it was scary for the first time when they announce your name and dive. It's still scary while your standing on the board or platform because there is silence, and everyone is looking at you! But it wasn't so scary after the first time!
